The Harmonists were instrumental in bringing many industries to Beaver County and growing them, including: buying The Pittsburgh Cutlery Company in 1867 and developing it as Beaver Falls Cutlery for mass production; investing in the construction of the P&LE Railroad in 1877 in order to move steel throughout the county; and giving striking glass workers the means to open Cooperative Flint Glass Company in 1879. The Harmonists also brought higher education to Beaver County when they made it possible for Geneva College to relocate to Beaver Falls from Ohio in 1880. These examples are at the center of the Beaver County Industrial Museum's special exhibit for 2024.

Unlike many religious dissenters who came to America, the Harmony Society embraced technological advances believing they were a fulfillment of biblical prophecy. Being shrewd businessmen they invested in the new steam powered trains and the coal that powered them to accumulate money to fund God's Kingdom. Locally the Harmonists invested in the following Beaver County railroads: Pittsburgh, Fort Wayne and Chicago Railway, the Darlington and Cannel Coal Railroad, Beaver Valley Railroad and Pittsburgh and Lake Erie Railroad. The Ho Train display typifies the railroads and communities of 20th century Beaver County.

Enon Valley has many German Ancestors, many of whom began arriving when the railroad came through in the 1850s. German-born citizens (or those of German ancestry) often came by way of Pittsburgh and made their way to our little town, bringing their artisan skills, business intelligence, and work ethic. From tavern keepers to harness makers, and from cobblers to storekeepers, the German citizens left their mark on the growth of Enon Valley. The names of Foertch, Fischer, Goschke, Inboden, Zich, Renner, (and many others) made a proud heritage for their descendants. All these occupations were successful and necessary to the booming railroad industry at the turn of the Century. Many descendants of these industrious families still reside in the area. We will display some family trees of many of these families throughout our museum to show their contributions and the many connections between the families.

Although we have no sales records that survived many of the glass factories that Mr. H. C. Fry was a part of, we are confident that Old Economy purchased glass locally because it was close by, of high quality, and known worldwide. After numerous ventures in a variety of glass factories in Western Pennsylvania, he eventually built the Rochester Tumbler Works in 1872. After a fire, the H.C. Fry Glass Company emerged in North Rochester. Over 1,000 pieces of Fry Glass are on permanent display in Rochester. Fry Glass was a premium glass product sold world wide.

Two main differences were their opposition to celibacy and the use of tobacco. The theme for 2024 is

“Our Ties to Old Economy Village.”

In 1824 the Harmonist Society moved from Indiana to Economy (now Ambridge.) Under the efficient management of Frederick Rapp, the society members enjoyed such prosperity that they eventually dominated the trade and markets of Pittsburgh and down the Ohio River. They were supportive of the arts as they had a museum with fine art and antiquities, orchestra, deer and floral park, and even a labyrinth maze. The Harmonists were industrious and aided in the construction of the Pittsburgh and Lake Erie Railroad, established a savings institute, brick works, cutlery, planing mill and lumber company. They even donated land for the construction of Geneva College.

Many of our sites had ties to the village – either purchasing items from their stores, or providing valuable resources for their business ventures.

Each of our 25 participating sites will share their connection with the Harmonists. In 1916, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania acquired 6 acres and 17 original Harmonist buildings. The Village was designated as a National Historic Landmarks District in 1965.
